PRESIDENT'S NOTE

Greetings NYSMEAns,

NYSMEA has been very busy the past seven weeks in a variety of marine education events. The new school year is always exciting and NYSMEA is providing multiple opportunities for marine enthusiasts and students to get involved. Dr. Michael Passow, President of the National Earth Science Teachers Association (NESTA), hosted a NYSMEA meeting and gave a tour of the marine biology and earth science research facilities at Columbia University's Lamont-Doherty Earth Observatory on August 30. Mike also led a pre-meeting kayak tour for us along the Hudson River out of Piermont, NY. We were fortunate to spot several ospreys living along the waterfront.

The International Coastal Cleanup on September 19 at Kaiser Park along Coney Island Creek was attended by over 300 people. Students seined for local marine species to identify, launched ROVs, monitored oysters, performed water chemistry and sand coring activities, and removed 3000 pounds of marine debris from the waterfront. Dr. John Tanacredi of Molloy College spoke about a variety of issues affecting our local New York coastlines. He discussed management and monitoring of Jamaica Bay over the many years, and also spoke about protecting local habitat and species. Dr. Jennifer Mattei of Sacred Heart University spoke about her creation of an artificial reef to restore a Connecticut coastline. She also spoke about her efforts to conserve horseshoe crabs through "Project Limulus." There were very informative workshops on local fish species, horseshoe crabs, ice storms, hurricanes, salt marshes and shoreline protection. The field trips to Oceanside Nature Center, the Center for Science Teaching and Learning, and the Oyster Hatchery/Energy facility at Point Lookout were fun and educational. The food, facility and auction were a big hit. There was a very positive energy from NYSMEA members throughout the conference.






NYSMEA Holiday Party - December 5th
