The Creature Corner: YOU!

Did you know that the biggest source of water pollution doesn't come from factories dumping waste or cities dumping garbage, but from each one of us?

The biggest source of water pollution comes from the surface water washing over our driveways, parking lots and streets!? Yup, it's true-- it's called polluted stormwater or polluted runoff. Stormwater mixes with pollutants, such as fertilizers, pesticides, oil, and pet waste, that are on the hard surfaces in our neighborhood. This polluted stormwater washes into rivers or stormdrains, which in most cases, lead directly to our waterbodies, untreated!

How can you help protect our marine waters? How about trying some of these simple tips:

1. Educate yourself and others with science-based information. Join NYSMEA and learn from other educators, just like you! We have lots of great Web links on our Web site, as well as various lesson plans that will allow you to teach your students about water pollution. Check it out!
